Introduction & Dedication

(Book 2)

The HAPPY FINGERS books are designed to challenge and encourage braille readers of all ages so that ears, voices, and fingers can work together in the enjoyment of music. Songs are presented in order of difficulty, beginning with the easiest. A new section entitled “Notes to Students and Teachers” has been added to summarize the music terms and concepts presented in each song.

The HAPPY FINGERS books are gratefully dedicated to Louis Braille and Bettye Krolick. In the nineteenth century, Louis Braille invented the braille music system so that visually impaired musicians could read, learn, and write music independently. In the twentieth century, Bettye Krolick stabilized and publicized braille music so that braille readers could continue to benefit. Throughout her many years of transcribing and teaching, Bettye insisted that braille music is not hard to learn. She knew that musical fulfillment must be more than mere imitation or rote learning. Bettye helped us understand that braille music skills enable visually impaired musicians to excel as creators and leaders.

Now in the twenty-first century, we are using the computer to share the joys and opportunities that Louis and Bettye have given to us.

Notes to Students & Teachers

HAPPY FINGERS BOOK 2 introduces sharps and flats, repeats, first and second endings and melodies that will challenge your braille reading skills. Listed below are a few notes to guide you in your journey to braille music literacy. Please note, the guitar chords shown in the printed music score are not included in the braille transcription.

1. America the Beautiful: This song is a review of the key of C and the use of dot 5 in the music to indicate that a measure is incomplete and will continue on the next line. The piece introduces the sharp sign on the single note, C sharp.
2. Yankee Doodle: Introduction to the key of G. One sharp is in the key signature and all F notes are sharp. The time signature of "common time" is introduced, and is counted the same as 4/4 time: four beats to a measure. Quarter note rests have been added for practice in reading the code for this one-beat rest.
3. Dona Nobis Pacem: Another song in the key of G that can be sung as a three-part round. The melody has intervals of sixths, sevenths, and octaves, all of which require octave signs. The single measure repeat sign and slurs of three and four notes are introduced for the first time.
4. Hush Little Baby: Introduction to the key of F. One flat is in the key signature and all B notes are flat. Extra verses are listed and the words do not match the first verse rhythm. You will have to figure out how to squeeze them in or spread them out over each measure.
5. Are You Sleeping: Another song in the key of F that can be sung as a four-part round. Repeats are introduced and signs for the beginning and end of a repeated phrase. Text repeats are also used.
6. America (My Country, 'Tis of Thee): Key of F in 3/4 time and dotted rhythms. The melody of this song is also the British National Anthem "God Save the Queen."
7. Skip to my Lou: Introduction to the key of D. Two sharps are in the key signature; all F and C notes are sharp. The words in both the VERSE and CHORUS are repeated three times, shown as a text repeat.
8. Home on the Range: Introduction to the key of B-flat. Two flats are in the key signature; all B and E notes are flat. The melody has quite a wide range and octave signs are required.
9. Jingle Bells: Introduction of first and second endings and the fermata sign.
10. This Old Man: This very familiar song is written out with each verse in a new key. It begins and ends in the key of C and modulates to the keys of D, E, F, and G. The key signatures are not shown; all the flats and sharps are shown in the music.
